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## FOREWORD

To those unacquainted with the life story of St. Gemua Galgani, some little introduction may be welcome. She was born on March 12, 1878, at Camigliano, a small town in the neighborhood of Lucca, Italy. From her earliest years she was an angel of piety and innocence. When Gemma became of school age the family moved to Lucca and her education was confided to the Sisters of St. Zita. Her mother died when she was but eight years old.

In 1897 her father's death occurred, and the following year Gemma herseit teit aangerously ill. This period of her life marks the beginning of the extrordinary mystical graces which characterize her spiritual life. She was miraculously cured through the intercession of St. Gabriel, and was favored by several apparitions of this saint.

Not only St. Gabriel, but her Guardian Angel. the Blessed Virgin, and Our Lurd appeared to her and spoke to her. The Evil One himself was also among her visitors and he left nothing undone to torment and terrify her.

She bore on her body the marks of the stigmata, and also those of the crown of thorns. Every week, be-
tween Thursdsy night and Filday nfternoon, she went through all the sufferings of the Sacred Passion.

Because of the uncongenial atmosphere of her owe home, and in whedience to the wishes of Our Lord, Gemma accepted, in 1894 . the invitation of the Giannini family to cume and make her home with them. Here shn was lowed and respected even to the point of veneration, Her place in the family was that of an adopted daughter.

When, in 1goz. Gemma developed tuberculosis, the Giannini lamily were advised by the doctor to send her away in order to safeguard the health of their own children. They delayed long in doing so, but finally, in January. 1go3. they rented a room for her in a neighbor= ing bouse and prevailed upon one of her aunts to act as her nurse. Here Gemma died, in the arms of a member of the Giannini family on April 12, 1903, which, that year, was Holy Saturday.

The following letters are only a few of the one hundred and fifty or so collected by Padre Germano. As Gemme never dated a letter, it is not possible to give them in chronological order.

Gemma's confessor during piectically the whele of her Dife was Msgr. Volpi, who later became Bishop of Arezzo, In order that he might not be alone is the gui-
dance of this highly favored soul, he asked and obtained the assistance of Padre Germano, a Passionist priest whose ordinary place of residence was Rome. Business of one kind or another relating to his Congregation often brought him to Lucca. While there lie was a guest of the Giannini family and it was here that he was an eye-witness of Gemma's extraordinary holiness.

Though the visits of Padre Germano to Lucca were frequent, Gemma's ordinary intercourse with him was by means of letters, every one of which he preserved. though not all have been given to the public. They deal with all the various phases of her spiritual life sand reveal the saint to us just as she was, simple as a child, lovable. human, and deeply sympathetic with every form of human woe.

Padre:- All that I write is writien sitaply through obedience, and with the greatest repagnance. In regard to all those things which it seems to me that I see and hear every day, I feel the greatest pain; but the command has been given and that comus before everything.

Last night, when I we:t to pray before Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, I heard someone call me,-it seemed to me that it was Jesus. (Patire, before you read any further, I beg you, for charity's sake. not to believe anything, anything at all: I write only to obey: otherwise, I would not have said a single word about what follows.) He said to me;-"Daughter, write to that Fether whom your confessot wishes. Do it because it is My desire."
"But Jesus" I repliced, "do I understand Thee? Do You wish the Fiather to know everything that concerns me?"

I was about to continue, but it seemed to me that Jens (or rather, my own head) would not let me, for He

said:- "That is My will from now on."
When I heard this I was no longer able to speak and Jesus, so it seemed to me, continued:-
'"Daughter, blind ohedience, perfect obedience, that is the first thing to remember." He added:- "You must be as a dead body: everything that they would have you do. do it promptly. In these days you shall do nothing without first asking counsel of Me."

Padre, for charity's sake, don't believe a word of all this. In order to write jou these things I have to do such violence to myself, but I have wished to obey.

This moming, after Holy Communion, Jesus seemed to let me feel His presence. Padre. what moments! But, alter a short thme, all was over, 1 kept repeating to Jesus "Ny Jesus:" I was not ainle to express myself very well. hut Jests understood.

Padre, do you koow the latest idea that has come into my head? It is to become a saint at all costs. I made chis resolution yesterday evening. During my meditation I was thinking:- one lives only once; it is certain that one shall die; and then one has to answer to God. And I know that this God punishes the wicked with eternal fire.

This malediction, Padre, causes me such fear. For the love of Jesus, send me your Angel to drive away the

demon (whom, with the help of our Blessed Mother, I have overcome during the past two daysi) and beg Jesus to give me the grace to fight rictoriously. After my many sins I have learned that Jesus is a real father, full of mercy. How is that? If I, after so many sins, do not know that the goodness of the Heart of Jesus is more than pacernal. I must have lost my reason! And what a heart is mine! At last the light has dawned upon my soul; I see how much harm I have done by sin.

Ah! When I see Jesus in tears, it pierces my heart. I realize that I. by my sins, have increased the burden which overwhelmed Him while He prayed in the garden. At that moment Jesus saw all my sins, all my failings, and He saw, also, the place that I should have occupied in hull, if Thy Heart, O Jesus, hud not pardoned me

None of these things trouble me for my own sake, but because of Jesus, because He is not pleased with what took place yesterday evening. On the contrary. He is very much displeased,

And now, Padre, you should see how happy I am with Jesus only, how much more He loves me thus humil iated. Aunt is also very much distressed. I obeyed as best I could and have no ill-will toward anyone, not even the probe. I remained silent. I am happy with oaly Jesus. Poor Gemma.

VIIL, ON ANOTHER OCCASLON SHE ONCE MORE UXGES AN EMBASSY TO ST. GABRIEL,

By this time I am sure that you have once again had the good fortune to pray at the feet of Venerable Gabriel. How I envy you! I have a great many things to tell you, to be referred to the Saint. First of all, Padre, place in his hands the important affair of my soul. Ask him if I may hope to save it. Ask him not to permit me to be deceived, and also not to permit my director to be deceived. in guiding me as he does at present. Kneel and repeat to him that I have all the good will in the world to save this poor soul of mine, at the cost of any suffering, any sacrifice, or humiliation whatsoever. Tell him that, if I have neglected my soul, please to intercede for me with Jesus. I ought to have acted differently, I ought to have taken grester care of my soul because of Jesus and our Blessed Mother. The hour of repentance ought to have struck long ago for me, were it not that I am so obstinate in my sins. Tell him with all your heart to pray to Jesus not to spare me in the matter of trials. Suffering will uplift me spiritually. By abasing me, it will give me the

strength necessary to correspond to the grace of Jesus. Tell him that 1 am resolved to repair all my past sins, to be obedient, and so on.

O Padre, Padre, beseech him, pray to him like this: ask him to answer these questions:- "Gemma! What ever will become of her? All these things which she seems to see and to hear, whence come they? . . "I stop here because you know well what I would like to add. For the sake of charity, it won't do any harm if you lose a little time, if you have other business. Please stay awhile beside Brother Gabriel. Speak to him of me,- of all my alfairs. Tell him to send Jesus to me continually, that ${ }^{-1} \mathrm{am}$ longing to be at the feet of Jesus. Tell him to help me to pray better, beg him to make obedience sweet to me, to obtain for me a little patience. Take a little love from Brother Gabriel and send it to me. There are, then, two things which I recommend especially to you,- first, my scul, and then, all that the future may have in store for me, Padre, I have recommended so many things to you, but you will answer me, won't you?
